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


EVENTS REPORT

Eva Marie, was assisted by two other women they did a great job catering for such a number. I didn't hear any complaints - I enjoyed a lovely creamy mushroom pasta



After lunch, a number of us circulated around Rushworth, taking in the historic streetscape and buildings. Rushworth has a colourful history - a fairly short term gold rush, which was brought to a halt because of excessive ground water.



However the initial wealth generated is reflected in the substantial buildings, which present an evocative streetscape, reminding us of the past. Although the Rushworth goldfield is a relatively small and isolated one, it has had 26 mines and it operated continuously until the 1900s.

The streetscapes has been going about renovation and renewal - with the final stage yet to be completed. Roads, kerbing and lawns and public structures are very well maintained, adding to the ambience.



Internet

There is remnant recognition in the town of the railway, which connected Murchison East and Colbinabbin. This was in a time when railways criss-crossed the State of Victoria - opening up and connecting the regions to Melbourne with one another, which gave great

impetus to economic activity in the state. Transport prior to that time, was limited to walking, bicycling, horse and bullock power and occasionally by river.

I can recall when Rushworth, years ago, was a very sleepy hollow, which has since gone through a renaissance. I think that started many years ago with the introduction of a Bakery and then a Bendigo Bank and I see now there's a Pharmacist and a Butcher shop, a large supermarket and recently the introduction of a brand new petrol station.

Rushworth - A little history which gives you a glimpse into the past. Credits: Various internet.

Rushworth was established during the Victorian gold rush in 1853 Its post office opened on 16 September 1857.

Many workings developed into small open cuts up to 10 m wide, working multiple veins, e.g., Nuggetty, Phoenix and Growlers An estimated 97, 000 oz. of gold was produced from the Rushworth Goldfield (Garratt,1985).

Rushworth has retained much of its original character through one of very few remaining well-preserved main street of heritage buildings classified by the National Trust. There is something spectacular about Rushworth's main street. It is so wide and so elegant with historic buildings on either side and a huge median strip. It must be one of the most impressive main streets in rural Victoria.

In 1903 Rushworth was described in the Australian handbook:

In 1903 Rushworth was described in the Australian handbook:

RUSHWORTH (36° 36' S. lat., 145° 1' E. long.), a municipal town, with post, money-order, telegraph, and savings bank office, 104½ miles NE. of Melbourne, on the road between Runnymede and Murchison, 12 miles W. from the Murchison Railway Station, and 30 miles distant E. from the Elmore Railway Station. It is in the county of Rodney, Northern Province electorate, Northeastern police district, shire Waranga. Coaches run to and from Elmore, Whroo, and Bailieston, fare to Elmore Ss. 6d., to Whroo Is. 6d., to Bailieston 3s. It is the terminus on the branch railway line from Murchison; fares, 18s. 10d. and 12s. 8d. Principal hotels are the Criterion, Rushworth, Cricketer's Inn. Imperial, Telegraph and Royal. The Commercial and Bank of Victoria have branches; also a State school (No. 1,057), Episcopal, Presbyterian, Wesleyan, Methodist, and Roman Catholic churches, court-house, treasury, shire and Water Trust offices and shire hall. Social Institutions: Freemasons', A.O.F., M.U.I.O.O.F. and A.N.A. lodges, mechanics' institute, with a library of 2,000 volumes. Lighted with brancage. with a library of 3,000 volumes. Lighted with kerosene. Both alluvial and quartz mining also is followed to a considerable extent. The yield for 1900 was 1,499 ozs. The water supply is derived from a reservoir which can store 11,000,000 gallons. In Waranga shire (area 700 square miles) 63,915 acres are under tillage, 33,606 wheat, 12,369 oats. Annual value of ratable property, £62,898; rate, 1s.; dwellings, 2,000; ratepayers, 1,947. Population, about 1,000; of shire, 5,890. Geological formation: slate and sandstone ranges, and box forests, also ironbark. Principal industry is farming; the butter industry is assuming large dimensions. Newspaper: Rushworth Chronicle, published on Fridays.

Whroo

Located 7 km south of Rushworth, is Whroo Historic Reserve, now a ghost town and a reminder that once there was a bustling gold mining town which, at its peak in 1857, had a population of 2100 and 139 buildings.

Gold was discovered in 1853. The find was so rich it had 15-cm gold veins and yielded well over £1 million worth of gold. A row of sugar gums marks the site of a mechanics institute where balls were held on moonlit nights (owing to the lack of electricity) from 1859 to 1955. The Whroo Cemetery contains the graves of over 400 people are buried. Other relics include cyanide vats and a puddling machine.



The ironwork for the bridge was made by Rowland Brotherhood, of Chippenham, Wiltshire, under the supervision of British Railway engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel. The foundation stone was laid by Mr. W. S. Urquhart Wednesday 25 September 1861

Introduction of heavier locomotives in the 20th century required strengthening of the bridge with steel trestles added between the original masonry piers in 1933-1934. Construction cost was 230,000 pounds (\$460.000)

I recall riding in the driver's cab of a passenger locomotive in the 1980s - one foggy morning - we arrived at the Taradale bridge, couldn't see a thing - too late, we kept going and proceeded to cross the bridge safely.

It is possible to walk within the girders of the bridge, which allows structural inspection.





After passing under the bridge, we had a run along a beaut winding road, ending up with a U-turn, where we encountered lots of evidence of shredded tyres!

The local lads of been out having a having a bit of fun and making their contribution to the tyre companies.

Then, to the pleasant public park in Taradale which was carpeted with fallen autumn leaves. Graeme Jenkins provided some wood and lit a welcome fire in the shelter to warm us up.



We were then presented with a sumptuous morning tea, presented by the creative bakers in the club. YUMMO! Many thanks ladies.





More Holdens Badged as Chevrolets for South Africa - Pintererst







From 1969, the local arm of the Blue Oval our home-grown **Falcon** utes to South Africa in complete knock down (CKD) kits. The first Falcon was the XT ute, setting a template for all those which followed by being rebadged as a **Ford Ranchero**. The Ranchero nameplate was borrowed from the US. For South

Africa however, it was Aussie-built Falcons wearing the Ranchero badge, with a succession of Aussie-designed models. Following the XT ute, South Africa received the XW, XY, XA and XB models, all in CKD form and all assembled at Ford's local assembly plant in Port Elizabeth. The XB Ranchero remained on sale until 1976. The Aussie ute made a brief comeback in South Africa in 1996, Ford Australia exporting fully-assembled XH Falcon utes. There are no confirmed numbers of Falcons Rancheros, although one article, dated from 1973, suggested around 15,000 were sold in South Africa from 1968-73, a timely reminder of our own local manufacturing industry stretched beyond Australia.



South Africa - CHRYSLER AUSTRALIA

The Chrysler by Chrysler four-door model was locally built and sold in South Africa as the

"Dodge SE" along with other Australian Valiant models.

A version of the Regal was manufactured for the South African Police as the SPP package in the late 1970s which featured triple carburettors, an up rated gearbox, up rated differential, and larger disc brake.

Approximately 2000 of this version were built and supplied.

New Zealand also imported the Chrysler by Chrysler which was sold alongside other Australian Valiants which were otherwise locally assembled by Todd Motors in Wellington

VK assembly did not begin in New Zealand until nearly a year after Australian launch because a 60% sales tax levied on large engine cars, introduced during the 1973-4 oil crisis, drastically slowed VJ sales. The model range in New Zealand was pared down to Regal and Regal 770 editions.

Japan

The VH Valiant Charger and CJ Chrysler by Chrysler were exported to Japan via Mitsubishi. These were not successful due to the winding narrow roads of Japan, and the spiralling fuel costs Japan was experiencing as one of the targeted nations during the 1973 oil crisis.

United Kingdom

Australian Valiants were exported to the United Kingdom from the late 1960s to 1976 including the Chrysler By Chrysler.

When I visited in Greece in 1977, I recall seeing an export LHD Holden. Holdens at that time were also exported to Asia, Africa and the Middle East Ed.
